GRL Studies Author Guidelines

GRL Studies Editorial Committee Established on August 5, 2025

1. Purpose

These guidelines outline the requirements for preparing manuscripts submitted to *GRL Studies*, the annual report of the Gender Research Library at Nagoya University.

2. Submission Format

- (1) Manuscripts should preferably be prepared using Microsoft Word.
- (2) Do not insert page numbers.
- (4) An abstract is required (see section 4).

3. Fonts

Fonts: Times New Roman. Font sizes: Main text; 11pt, Notes: 10 pt, Title: 12 pt

4. Structure of the Manuscript

(1) Manuscripts should follow the order:

Title (if there is a subtitle, precede it with a colon).

Author name(s), affiliation(s)/position(s).

Table of contents (not required for shorter pieces)

Main text.

Acknowledgments (if necessary).

Notes.

- (2) For section numbering:
- Chapters: 1., 2., 3., ...
- Subsections: (1), (2), (3), ...

5. Figures, Tables, and Images

- (1) Indicate the location of figures, tables, and images in the text. Submit all figures and tables in a separate file, consolidated into one file.
- Acceptable formats: Word, Excel for tables; JPEG or PNG for images.
- (2) Size calculation for the length:
- Half-page (B6): count 300 words.
- Quarter-page (B7): count 150 words.
- (3) All figures and tables must include a caption below with table/figure number, title, explanation (if necessary), and source.(e.g., Figure 1 XXXX, Figure 2 YYYY (insert a space between the number and title)
- (4) Indicate sources for all tables/figures, even if self-created. Obtain prior permission from copyright holders where necessary.

6. Notes

- (1) Use the Word's endnote function for notes. Font size: 10pt. Superscript numbers should be Arabic (e.g., : 1, 2)
- (2) Citations in text should follow the author-year format in parentheses:
- Single author: (Maekawa 2017: 182-183)
- Multiple works: (Yamada 1980, 1990)
- Co-authored works: (Yamada and Tanaka 2020)

• More than three authors: (Yamada et al. 2021)

7. Quotations

- (1) Short quotations: enclose "".
- (2) Long quotations: separate from the text with a blank line before and after, indent five characters at the beginning, and provide the citation at the end.

8. References

- (1) List all references at the end of the manuscript in alphabetical order by author's surname.
- (2) All in-text citations must appear in the reference list, and vice versa.
- (3) Do not break bibliographic information across lines; indent the second and subsequent lines by three full-width spaces.
- (4) For multiple works by the same author, replace the author's name in the second entry and beyond with a dash (----), and list in ascending order by publication year.

Examples:

Book (single author)

Scott, Jean Wallach, 1988, Gender and the Politics of History, New York: Columbia University Press.

• Book (multiple authors)

Roberts, Marie Mulvey and Tamae Mizuta, 1994, The Campaigners: Women and Sexuality, London: Routledge/Thoemmes Press.

Edited Book

Stanton, Elizabeth Cady, Susan B. Anthony, and Matilda Joslyn Gage, eds., 1969, History of Woman Suffrage, New York: Arno Press.

Edited Book Chapter

Winterburn, Emily, 2022, "Astronomy, Education and the Herschel Family: From Caroline to Constance," Claire G. Jones, Alison E. Martin, Alexis Wolf, *The Palgrave Handbook of Women and Science since 1660*, Cham: Palgrave Macmillan, pp. 247-268.

Journal Article
